### **News from the Parish – 24th April 2020**

Thursday evenings, at 8.00pm, are slightly surreal yet uplifting. As I stand on the side of the A272, separate groups of neighbours line the road and – for that minute, maintaining social distance – we clap hands, sound horns, ring bells or hit saucepans. This usually sets dogs off barking, but as one group of neighbours stops you can hear others continuing further away to left and right.

There's not much mention of clapping in the Bible, and a quick internet search finds some theological discussion around whether such behaviour - in church services – has any biblical authority. Yet often we encourage applause; when a child is baptised or a couple married. It is a sign of thanks, but also a sign of happiness and good will. Isaiah 55: 12

You will go out in joy and be led forth in peace; the mountains and hills will burst into song before you, and all the trees of the field will clap their hands.

At this time we continue to include in our prayers all those who are feeling lonely and isolated, may they find friendship in different ways. We also include all those who are unwell, whether from the coronavirus or any other illness.

### THIRD SUNDAY OF EASTER

Gospel: Luke 24: 13-35

In the Gospel appointed for Easter 3 we hear how two disappointed disciples are transformed when a stranger (the risen Christ) opens the scriptures to them and reveals himself as Lord in the breaking of bread. The Emmaus story becomes our story as we hear the word of God and recognise Jesus in the breaking of bread.

In the new experience of the risen Jesus, the two disciples' past is changed. They can now revisit the past with the new light and love they have experienced. They can take the new light of Easter Sunday back even into the darkness of Good Friday, and everything looks different now. Only the risen Jesus makes sense of everything in the present and what went before.

When we gather, and when we can come to celebrate the Eucharist we too listen to the word of God and break bread. Jesus comes to us not as a stranger; rather he comes to us in word and sacrament to give us new hope to face the future with faith in him.

Today our stories, the world's stories, do not sound different from those two forlorn disciples on the road to Emmaus. We too may be covered in disappointment, we may be afraid; we may have a past and a present that does not make sense to us. But we are invited to tell our story to the Lord, to listen to him as he speaks his word and recognise him in the

breaking of bread, which is happening even when we cannot be physically present at the Eucharist. Only then can we look at the past and the present with understanding and hope for the future.

Eternal, loving God, you give us Jesus Christ as our companion on our journey. Help us to recognise him in word and sacrament and in those in need, especially at this critical time. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.
